Begonia 'Christmas Candy'

Begonia U014

According to Mary Weinberg Begonia U014 was first discovered in Ecuador in 1979 and imported by Tom Melelous and Fred Fuchs.

In May 1982 Kingsley Langenberg brought seedlings as a research project to the Greater Chicago Branch. Mary chose 3 plants-two became B. cucullata and the third was U014. They were planted outside in a shady area in sandy soil since her garden is five blocks They started new from Lake Michigan. growth and developed flower buds close to the ends of the stems. In mid September Mary potted them in an 8 inch azalea pot using the soilless mix recommended by Millie Thompson. She also included most of the garden soil attached to the roots. Then she placed B. U014 on the floor next to the light garden where it got early morning sun from an east window for about an hour and glancing light from the garden throughout the day. In October, blooms opened; then it was never without flowers during the winter.


In April Mary made 2 tip cuttings from the main stems. She removed the flowers to help promote root growth. Within 3 weeks both cuttings were rooted and were transplanted to a soil mix.

In summer B. U014 was returned to the shade garden to promote flowering with the intention of more tries at pollination since during the winter months male flowers did not open probably because the plants did not have enough light. (Continued page 2)

Begonia U014 (Continued)

Mary describes this begonia as a shrub-like plant with grass-green, ovate, subentire leaves 4-5 inches long. Stipules are obtuse, and tan in color. Channeled petioles are arranged alternately along the stem; stems, petioles, and leaves are glabrous. Flowers are large, orange-red with white ovaries. Staminate flowers have five tepals, and pistillate flowers have 2 tepals. Female flowers have 3 orange-red bracts loosely veiling the ovaries.

Successful crosses have been made using B. U014 as the male parent; in all cases it was crossed with semperflorens. Hybrids from these crosses are B. 'Christmas Candy,' B. 'Cockatoo,' and B. 'Firebird.' All hybrids retain the nearly ever-blooming quality and the large orange-red flowers.



HORTICULTURE


With the weather being so hot as it is now in triple digits, water the plants when the soil is dry. Watch for burning edges of leaves even when these begonias are in shade. Remove the yellow or dying leaf and keep the plants clean of any dead parts over the soil. Misting may help or for healthy begonias use a small amount of fertilizer in the water before misting the plants. Keep the floor damp for extra humidity.

At times it is wise to collect some rainwater in a container and use this to water begonias or simply have water drawn and allow it to stand for a few days before watering the plants. Add some Nutricote or Osmocote after watering and then fertilize with a ½ strength liquid fertilizer every month. Do not fertilize the plants when they are dry.
