Weeds steal the nutrients, moisture, and sunlight that the iris need to thrive so let's get out there and get rid of them, the sooner the better.

Hopefully, you got your iris fertilization done the middle of February but if not, go ahead and do it as soon as possible. Like weeding, this will help reward you with stronger plants and more blooms this Spring. For those of us that



have daylilies, mid-March is the target date for fertilizing those. Also, if you haven't done your preemergent treatment this Spring, now is the time; remember it has to be done BEFORE the weed seeds start to germinate.

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2017 AIS Convention Highlights : Rhythm of the Prairie by Ken Fuchs

The 2017 Convention began on Tuesday with reduced Board meetings, and the Silent Auction opened that evening. As usual, on Wednesday many different section meetings were held and there was also a very limited Simulated Iris Show with examples of the different types of irises. Section meetings included those for the Japanese, Louisiana, Reblooming, Novelty, spuria, and Tall Bearded Iris Societies.

Wednesday evening we were treated to a Welcome Reception at the Greater Des Moines Botanical Garden. The main structure at the



GDMBG is a beautiful conservatory inside an enormous geodesic dome. A tropical paradise enchanted us as we wandered the trails before attending the reception. Afterward, we strolled around a large oval-shaped garden behind the main building. It was surrounded by a large wall, and between the walkway on the outside of the wall itself were hundreds of irises in full bloom, grouped in different large clumps of identical cultivars. It was a breath-taking feast for the eyes.

There were only two days of bus tours. On Thursday, our first stop was the Brad Collins Garden located



in a multi-acre field in rural Iowa, southwest of Des Moines in Madison County. The irises were in two very long rows. There wasn't a lot of bloom, and mixed in with the guest irises were many seedlings. Garden judging classes were held there.

The Guest Iris Beds at the Botanical Garden were located in a fairly small area along the Des Moines River. There were lots of blooms, but sadly, all of the beardless irises had been neglected, and there were a couple dozen name tags for Louisiana irises clumped together in a bare patch. Nearby were a couple more name tags including Jim Landers' *Lady of Lometa.*

On Friday, our first stop was the Wayne and Pam Messer Garden. It



was a massive private garden extending on three sides of their house. The property was sloping and large clumps of blue Siberian irises greeted us as we got off the bus and walked up the driveway, enjoying the many blooms along the fence line and much more beside the house in the backyard.

Our second stop was Kris and Tom Jurik's garden located on a hillside just north of Ames, Iowa. The guest garden had numerous blooms for us to see. A rather steep switchback walkway let to the Juriks' own private garden located in a large open flat area below. It had long rows of enormous pink, red, yellow, and white peonies, with clumps of Siberian irises filling in the spaces in between. There were also more rows of tall bearded irises to keep everyone busy admiring and taking pictures.

At the Iowa Arboretum in Madrid,



in Boone County, over 400 guest bearded irises were on display. The blooms in the beds were spectacular. The first bed was in a circular design with double rows of irises. Several other beds had the same circular pattern. More beds were located along the pathways and there were convenient for viewing and very enjoyable.

Waco Judges Training by Tracey Rogers (Austin Iris Society)

Fourteen iris lovers from the Belton, Austin, Johnson County, and Waco clubs attended the judges training on Saturday, February 17th hosted by the Waco Iris Society.

Dell Perry, the Region 17 newsletter editor conducted the training on the topic: *Are these Really the Rules?* She addressed misconceptions that are commonly thought of as rules by both exhibitors and judges but are really pretender rules — rules that are commonly applied but may be being misapplied if they are even actually AIS rules.

Pretender rules include personal prejudices such as "I don't like bro-



ken color irises," sparse details in handbook, misconceptions, applied common sense, 'that's how it has always been done,' taught by another judge, and rules that differ by area, region or affiliate club.

One of the biggest points I came away with is Dell's suggestion for judges to read the Handbook from cover to cover just before show season starts as a refresher. You can't remember everything. I would suggest that show chairs read it too before reviewing or revising a show schedule. Many rule issues that aren't clear in the Judges Handbook can be addressed in the show schedule.

While all judges training classes are informative, I would recommend that everyone attend this class as it reveals a lot of assumptions iris growers make about rules for judging that just aren't the case, or in other words they aren't rules, but are pretender rules. Examples of assumptions that aren't rules include faulting crinkled leaves, and paper spathes should always or never be trimmed. Crinkling is weather related and is normal in Louisiana irises. Detectable trimming is mentioned in the Handbook, but it isn't banned.

One topic that frequently comes up in our show is whether to wipe the stalks or not. The Handbook states under "Cleanliness" – 'The stalk, flower and blossoms should be clean with no dirt, dust or spray residues. Slight smudges or fingerprints on the stalks demand little penalty and are easily removed when the exhibitor gently wipes the stalk with a soft tissue.' This is an example of a custom or show rule, so put the rule in the show schedule to determine if wiping is allowed.

Hopefully a lot of the points raised by Dell will be addressed whenever the new Judges Handbook comes out.


