An overdue Merry Christmas and Happy New Year to one and all! Now that the holidays are behind us it is time to start thinking IRIS and all things gardening again. We undoubtedly have some cold and dreary days remaining before we can begin our Spring gardening rituals, but there are quite a few things that we could and should be addressing now. Those days when we would really rather not be outdoors would be the time for looking at iris in the catalogs and on the internet (there is a listing of commercial iris gardens available on the AIS website at http://irises.org/ Resources/Commercial that can be helpful), learning about the new trends in iris hybridizing and making a "must have" list of some of those to acquire in the upcoming season. There will also be lots of really fantastic days to get out in the garden and get things done before the busy Spring season is upon us. If you need to start a new bed, right now is the time to do it. Get your soil improvements, compost, manures, alfalfa pellets, minerals and organic fertilizers worked into

the bed so they will have time to go to work improving the soil in time for planting. How about getting started on some of those projects you have been putting off? Do you need to lay some stepping stones, build a new patio, deck or put in some hardscape features? Add some ground cover or mulch or maybe a nice garden bench or swing so you will have a great place to sit and admire your beautiful landscape. Even though the weather has been exceptionally mild so far this Winter, now is **not** the time to begin pruning roses or shrubs. They will start putting on new growth about three weeks after pruning and a severe cold snap could kill off the new growth severely setting the plants back. Wait until at least the middle of February so that any new growth will begin in March and it should be OK. This is, however, the perfect time to remove limbs from trees if needed. Also, the next couple of weeks is an ideal time to survey your garden beds and make a list of what needs to happen come Spring and decide what the priority should be. Please mark your calendars - the

Spring iris fertilization is rushing upon us in mid-February. A great way to remember to do that is Valentine's Day; send your true love chocolates and treat your iris to a Spring feast.

Meeting Minutes By Bill Calhoon, Secretary



Waco Iris Society - Meeting Minutes Saturday, November 19, 2018 Meeting held at Crestview Church

of Christ Community Center.

Club President Dan Cathey called the meeting to order at 10:16 a.m. and welcomed members in attendance. Nineteen (19) members were present at the meeting.

Secretary Bill Calhoon conducted Roll Call. The minutes of the September 2018 meeting were published in the WIS Newsletter. After receiving no additions or corrections from the floor, Dan declared the minutes approved as published.

Treasurer Mitchell Whitley then presented the Treasurer's Report. The account balance as of October 15 was \$10,601.20. Assistant Treasurer Peggy Cathey reported that the balance as of November 13 was \$10,247.47. A Treasurer's Report also had been published in the newsletter. After receiving no additions or corrections from the floor, the Treasurer's Report was approved. that the proceeds from the September Rhizome Auction were approximately \$1400; approximate proceeds from the Annual Rhizome Sale were \$1700. Dan expressed appreciation for the support of Club members of the auction and providing rhizomes for and working at the annual sale.

Show Chair Ken Anderson provided an update on plans for the 2019 Iris Show to be held the second Saturday in April. Ken had additional copies of the Artistic Division Categories available for distribution. The categories were also included in the Club newsletter. Ken reported that he was in the process of updating the Show Schedule and asked for volunteers to fill Show Committee positions. Club members were encouraged to consider potting extra rhizomes for sale at the Show. Pots should contain at least two rhizomes; three are better and should be potted soon to allow for root development.

Dan reminded members that plant markers are available for purchase by club members.

In New Business, Peggy announced that Bonnie Nichols had recently been named AIS Judges Liaison and 2nd Vice President at the recent AIS Board Meeting.

Mitchell Whitley thanked the club for sending flowers and attending the visitation for his mother's funeral.

Bill conducted the AIS drawing which was won by Michael Lowe.

Following a break for refreshments, Dan asked Ken Fuchs, who was presenting the day's program, to preface the program with comments on his recent trip to South Korea as part of the Peace Corps Volunteer Re-Visit Program. Ken then presented a slide show featuring photographs from "Fleur-de-Gras" the 2018 AIS Convention which was held in New Orleans and was a coconvention with the Society for Louisiana Iris (SLI). The convention was attended by over 300 people.

Following the program, Michael Lowe and Frances Peterson both reported they had iris reblooming.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:20 a.m.
