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It is that time of year again. It is the time of year when the summer has been so hot it is hard to imagine that in a few weeks, we will begin to experience some pleasant weather. Unless you have been out of the state and spending your summer elsewhere, I don't have to tell you how hot it has been. I have never served time in prison, but I think this summer, all of us felt like we were imprisoned in our houses with one of the hottest summers we have experienced in a long time. Whether it was stepping out to get the mail, going to the grocery store, or running any errand, I don't think any of us wanted to be outside past noon. According to the weather forecast, we should see an end to all the 100degree days very soon. With that being said, it is time to take a stroll through our gardens and make note of many things. My advice is to plan that stroll as soon after daybreak as possible. If you like to make lists, you might want to jot down a few things that need to be accomplished once the heat sub-More importantly, you sides. might want to make a list specifically about your irises. Take note of what survived and what needs to be divided. For any member who is new to growing irises, keep in mind that is important to dig up and divide clumps a few years after planting a new variety. If a variety is growing very well for you, this process of digging and dividing might occur as early as the third year. When clumps are left undivided for too many years, the size of the rhizomes decrease, and the amount of bloom decreases or disappears completely.

The September stroll is important because now is the time to begin deciding which clumps definitely need to be dug and divided. If you are planning to bring rhizomes to the iris sale, it is not too early to start making a list of what you will be bringing. Without getting too detailed, the way that many members handle this task is to dig one clump at a time. As you begin to break up the clump, write the name on the innermost leaf of the fan on every rhizome (or even on the rhizome itself if the leaves are very small) before doing anything else. Once the rhizomes are cleaned up, it is time to divide them into three groups. The first group contains the ones to be kept for your own garden. The second group are the ones that are welldeveloped and can be prepared for the sale. The third group are the smaller ones that can be put in pots of two or more rhizomes for the potted iris sale in the spring.



Keep in mind that the smaller ones might look insignificant when planted, but with a minimal amount of care throughout the winter, they will produce rhizomes large enough to bloom the following spring. For more specific information regarding trimming up and cleaning rhizomes, how to attach price tags, how to price, etc., please refer to your yearbook. If you have questions, please ask any member who has been doing this for a while.

As usual, the summer heat has taken a toll on many of our irises. Those growing out in full sun likely look the worst. Those that have received some shade are in better condition. As the cooler weather arrives and, hopefully, some rain, the rhizomes will begin to revive. It is always amazing to see how quickly these plants respond to cooler weather.

September is a busy month for iris gardeners. It is time to dig, divide, amend the soil, replant, and prepare spaces for new irises. In addition to those garden tasks, it is time to prepare rhizomes for the sale that is held on the last Saturday of September. Our first meeting, which is the "giveaway" and auction, will be on Saturday, September 16, at the Crestview Church of Christ, 7129 Delhi Road in Waco. Our rhizome sale will be two weeks later, on Saturday, September 30, at the GreenLife Nursery located at 1312 N. New Road in Waco.

Despite the extremely hot and extremely dry summer, I hope your irises have survived. I also hope you will have rhizomes to bring to the rhizome sale. I look forward to seeing everyone at the first meeting of our 2023-2024 club year. Until the first meeting, be sure to enjoy a stroll through your garden.

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As stated in our club by-laws, Article XXII, General:

Section V: All members present at the annual iris gift plant meeting who have attended at least three (3) meetings during the past club year and assisted in either the Iris Show or Rhizome Sale will be eligible to receive a gift rhizome purchased by the Society, provided the member's dues are current. If a member has met the required attendance but is unable to attend the gift plant meeting due to illness or work, they may designate someone to act on their behalf. This person may then choose for the absent member, but only after the members present have chosen. Any new member who joins the Society after the last gift plant meeting, who is present, will be eligible to receive a gift plant. It will be determined at the May meeting, by member vote, where rhizomes will be ordered from and the amount to spend, including all shipping costs.
