TRAILING-SCANDENT BEGONIAS

These varieties are a small group consisting of about 35 species and 35 cultivars to date that trail or climb and have either thick or thin stems that branch regularly with regular pruning and pinching. The leaves can become rather large. Usually a cluster of white flowers appear on multiple spikes. Both natural species and cultivars require strong light or sunlight but not midday sun for healthy growth and flowers. They grow best when the temperature is 58-72 degrees F. Cold will slow their growth and it may be necessary to move them to a warmer area with ideal humidity around 50%

Use pruning and pinching for maintaining a compact plant that is leafy but not lengthy with bare places. What you want is multi-stemmed leafy growth from the base, accompanied by an abundance of flowers.

Shallow pots are ideal for potting these species and cultivars. Terracotta or plastic pots can be used if the soil provides good drainage. Use a small pot when beginning to plant and start pinching to shape the begonia. Then pot one size larger as needed. Use an indoor potting mix that retains moisture but drains freely.

At this time of year tuberous begonias make wonderful gifts at Christmas and throughout the New Year. Their huge colorful flowers bring great cheer to anyone who loves the exotic dwarf and bushy plants with huge brilliantly red, yellow, and white flowers.

Some of the strains popular today include tuberhybrida that has a single or double flower and good form for hanging baskets. Hiemalis also grows as a pot plant with double flowers. Cheimantha or "Christmas" Begonia are single flowered pot plants also grown in hanging baskets.

Natural species have green leaves of various shapes and are free flowering during the season.

Many are used in hybridizing. Semi-tuberous varieties do not always fully defoliate. Most have maple leaves and drooping stems and benefit from extra light.

Tuberous begonias also require some sun, some shade, and good lighting after dormancy. This rest period is usually , but not with every form, during winter.

Tubers left in pots over this period usually rot; therefore, remove the tuber, wash them and dry them. Then dust with sulphur or tomato dust as a protection from vermin or disease. Keep them in peatmoss or dry sand, label them, and periodically give them a light watering to prevent shrivelling.

In spring at 60 degrees F tubers will begin to grow. Some can then be started in a well drained potting mix. Plant the tuber so that the top of the tuber is showing. They should be kept warm until they root. Then lift and plant in a pot. Water carefully but do not allow them to dry out. When the flowering has finished, the plant will cease its growing cycle.
