

Byron Bradley (Brad) Kasperek March 8, 1945—October 18, 2022

Byron Bradley (Brad) Kasperek passed away at age 77 on October 18, 2022 at his home.

Brad and his wife Kathie, owned a successful Iris business called **Zebra Gardens** in Elwood, Utah. He loved hybridizing all kinds of flowers, but especially Irises. He won 17 awards for his Irises and won the AIS Hybridizer's Award in 2005 because of his knowledge in genetic crossing. He has an Iris named after him called the **'Bradley Badger'**. Brad and his wife also enjoyed

dancing together for many years and were known for their dancing abilities.

Brad is best his broken color irises and amusing animal names such as *Bewilderbeast* and *Drunk Skunk*.

No matter what happens indoors or outdoors, the calendar does not wait for us! Time keeps rushing by. Events in our lives tend to fill our days and weeks, but it seems like it was just a few days ago when we were hoping for the really hot weather had finally disappeared. Mother Nature seems to have no concern at all about our lists of things to do and occasionally demands that we drop what we are doing and turn our attention to more immediate life-or-death concerns when it comes to our plants. Suddenly, or so it seems, those of us who maintain a collection of various potted plants begin to wonder if it is now time to protect them from a frost or freeze as much cooler weather is being predicted. If you want smooth sailing, take up stamp collecting, reading, woodworking, knitting, or some other hobby not impacted by weather changes. If you stick with gardening, hang on for the ride. As usual, every season will bring its bumps and curves and maybe even a few bruises along the

way!

Hopefully, by now, everyone has added a bit of fertilizer to their iris beds. Halloween, as has been pointed out many times by Glenn Huddleston, is always a good reminder that it is time for the fall application of fertilizer. For those members who might not have had a lot of experience growing irises feel free to ask other members for advice regarding fertilization. Basically, a balanced fertilizer (all three numbers the same, such as 10-10-10 or 12-12-12) can be sprinkled around the iris clumps. Another approach Is using alfalfa pellets. Sprinkling alfalfa pellets around iris plants provide a good source of nitrogen and also adds organic matter to the soil. (You will learn a lot more about when and how to feed your irises during our program-Back to Basics-An Iris Refresher)

Most areas of central and north Texas have received some beneficial rains. If you follow the weather and pay attention to radar coverage, you

will notice that the rains can be wonderful in some areas, and just a few miles away, there is no rain at all. Fortunately, we have had a few systems move through, so by now, most areas have had at least some beneficial rainfall. The rains are coming at an ideal time for irises. They don't need a lot of water, but some rain at this time of year is certainly beneficial for root development. As always, it appears there is not much going on with our iris plants above the ground, but underneath the soil, there is a lot happen-

The theme for our show on April 8, 2023, will be "Saluting Those Who Serve". Descriptions for the artistic classes are being developed. Detailed information about the artistic divisions will be provided at our upcoming meeting.

ets. Raffle tickets are \$1 each or you can buy 6 chances for \$5. Money earned from raffle




sales goes toward our shows, AIS memberships, and annual iris giveaways.
